# Group Discussion



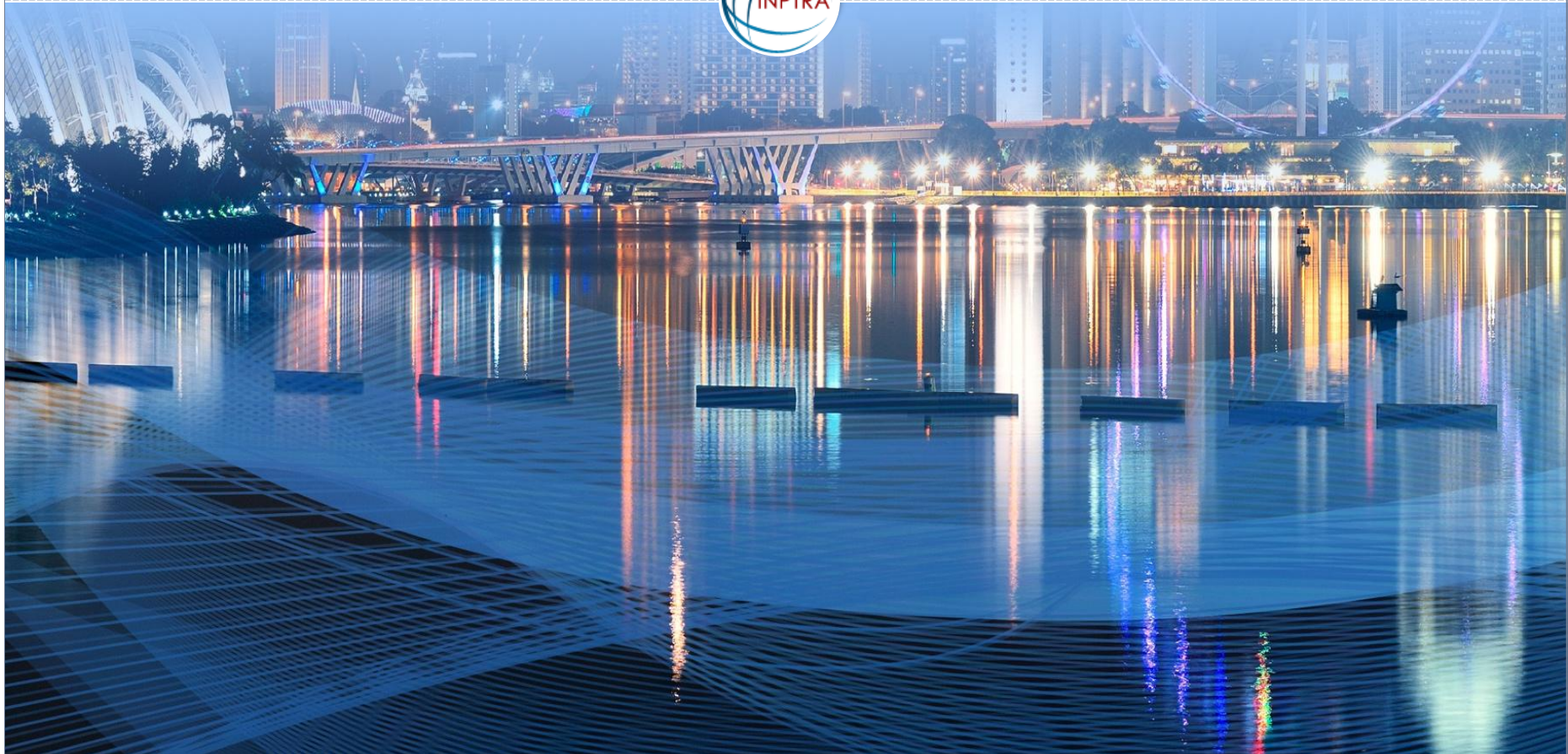
1. Is unethical practice inevitable – will a certain percentage of PTs always fall below ethical and competence standards no matter what we do?
2. Should we be screening applicants better or differently?
3. How do regulators recognize and manage ethical concerns and separate them from the legal issues?
4. Physiotherapy students are now registered under the National scheme in Australia. What power does or should the Registration Board have to investigate the behavior of students?
5. If a notification involves a level of clinical expertise that is beyond the experience of the regulatory board, where do they turn to for advice?
6. What is the most effective way to remediate professional behavioral issues, and what is most practical way to do remediation? Consider the types of issues people present with and potential for recidivism. Consider: On line courses, one on one mentoring, a dedicated small seminar type of course
